This smaller scale event was organized by long time Simpson employee and board member Pete Replinger. It gave those who collect diesel air horns a rare chance to mount them on a real locomotive and hear what they sound like. In total 6 participants

brought over 20 different styles, makes and colors. Once mounted on engine 900 Pete took the owner on a short run up and down the main giving them the chance to pull the "whistle cord". Being out in the Sortyard and away from homes and neighbors gives us the opportunity to make a bunch of noise without bothering anyone around us.

Recently the City of Shelton set a new world record reclaiming its title as Christmas tree capital of the world on December 7th. A total of 797 Christmas tress created a maze of lit tree's shattering the record of 559. The trees where part of the Christmas town, USA festival which pays homage to the town's rich timber heritage. Some of those trees were from the Simpson Railroad ROW, which helped us maintain and clear the ROW. At one time box cars full of trees left Shelton for destinations all over North America. Once the Festival was over those trees were donated, replanted or available for purchase with proceeds going to local charities and families in need.



5-5 continues to visit train shows

September 21st and 22nd the 5-5 ventured up to the north peninsula area for a visit to the North Olympic Peninsula Railroaders show and swap meet. The show was held at the Clallam County Fairground and organized by John Kumparak, a Simpson Railroad Volunteer. Next up was the Lewis County Model Railroad Club show and swap meet held at the Lewis County Fair Grounds October 12/13th. This year the 5-5 was outside and greeted visitors as walked up the shows entrance. One common observation is the 5-5 has become a popular addition to area train



shows, with some show organizers asking for it to attend. That shows that the word is getting out about ourselves and our mission. Additionally the shows create a little revenue from the sale of items to pay daily expenses.

Since September the majority of the work on the Simpson Railroad centered around coach 1212. Starting in September volunteer Dale Campbell spent some time removing a partition and

fire alarm system that were added for stationary non - railroad use. Once completed and having a better idea of the scope of work needed for interim use, our Holiday event work parties were held. A total of three work parties were held, the first two on November 24th and December 7th concentrated on a variety of tasks needing to be completed. Amongst those items, and not a complete list, was the removal of the old carpet, cleaning walls and ceiling, removal of non railroad and unnecessary electrical conduit, opening of the vestibule doors.

Out on the tracks volunteer Randal Washburn spent several days with a wrench tightening bolts and identifying others in need of more help than a wrench can provide.

With speeder rides being offered, Cory Wheeler, Pete Panos, and new volunteer to us (but not new to the Simpson) Michael Carlson spent time clearing tress and black berries from around the tracks where the speeders, with visitors, were going to operate.
